WHAT IS SAFEGUARDING?

Safeguarding is a term which is broader than 'child protection' and relates to the action taken to promote the welfare of children and protect them from harm.

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. Safeguarding is defined in 'Working Together to Safeguard Children 2015 as:

- protecting children from maltreatment
- preventing impairment of children's health and development
- ensuring that children grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care and
- taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes.

People who work with vulnerable groups, including children, must always act in their best interests and ensure they take all reasonable steps to prevent harm to them. Having safeguards in place within an organisation not only protects and promotes the welfare of children but also it enhances the confidence of trustees, staff, volunteers, parents/carers and the general public.

The necessity to safeguard children applies both to charities working in the UK and other countries where children may face different or additional risks of abuse or exploitation. These safeguards should include a Safeguarding Policy and procedures for dealing with issues of concern or abuse. For the purposes of child protection legislation the term 'child' refers to anyone up to the age of 18 years.

ATTENDANCE

Good attendance is vital to raising standards in school and to ensure every pupil reaches their full potential. Every pupil is entitled to a full time education. The government expects schools to promote good attendance and reduce absences. Parents have a legal obligation to ensure their child's regular attendance at school.

We understand that students are absent from school for a variety of reasons and often this includes genuine illness, urgent medical appointments and other essential absences. You must always let us know if your child is off, via **the school office**, as we have procedures to follow if we don't hear from you. Medical evidence will be required for appointments, but these should be made outside of school hours where possible.

<u>Please</u> help your child by trying to maintain their attendance above 96% as this is our school target.
