

Year 5 Spring Term 2026

This grid outlines the knowledge and skills that Year 5 children will gain throughout this term.

As readers we will:

Continue to develop our skills in language understanding and build upon and secure our knowledge of retrieval and inference within reading. We will read an exciting range of books to inspire and motivate us as readers as well as gaining exposure to inspire us in our own writing.



As mathematicians we will:

In the Spring Term, Year 5 will follow the White Rose Scheme of Learning, starting with **multiplication and division**, focusing on written methods, factors, multiples, and multi-step problem-solving. They will then explore **fractions**, including equivalence, improper fractions, mixed numbers, and operations such as addition, subtraction, and multiplication.

The term continues with **decimals and percentages**, where children will compare, order, and understand the link between fractions, decimals, and percentages. Finally, they will study **perimeter and area**, calculating these for various shapes. Problem-solving and reasoning will feature throughout, promoting a deeper understanding of key mathematical concepts.

As writers we will:

Be continuing to use Linked English as our approach to develop our children as readers, writers, speakers and listeners. We will continue to focus on our Year 5 brilliant basics with our super kinetic letter handwriting as well as using capital letters for names and places, full stops for the end of a sentence as well as exclamation, question and speech marks. We will focus using ambitious word choices, fronted adverbials, relative clauses and spelling Year 5 common exception words. We will be writing a suspense story and learn how to write a non chronological report

As scientists we will:

In the Spring Term, Year 5 will explore two exciting units: **Living Things and Their Habitats** and **Animals, including Humans**. In the **Living Things and Their Habitats** unit, pupils will study the life cycles of mammals, amphibians, insects, and birds, focusing on reproduction and growth. Throughout the term, children will develop their scientific enquiry skills through hands-on experiments, observations, and recording their findings systematically.

In **Animals, including humans** children will describe the changes as humans develop to old age. The children will develop their scientific enquiry skills through research, observation and recording.

As historians we will:

This spring, Year 5 will explore fascinating historical topics through the PKC Scheme of Learning. The term focuses on **The Transatlantic Slave Trade**. During this unit, the children will build upon their knowledge of empire and slavery. They will look at the atrocities of the Transatlantic Slave Trade, looking at how and why the forced migration of millions of Africans took place.

They will also study the **French Revolution**. Building on chronologically from the unit on the 'Early British Empire', the pupils examine how France's defeat, and loss of colonies in America, led to national debt, and exasperating feelings of social inequality which sparked the French Revolution.



As geographers we will:

In the Spring Term, Year 5 will follow the PKC Geography scheme, focusing on **Australia**. Within this unit children will use maps of Australia to identify key settlements, such as the capital city of Canberra, and identify biomes and rivers. They will study physical aspects of Australia's geography such as the desert, the tropical rainforests, the mountains and the rivers. They will learn about the importance of Uluru and how it is respected by the Aboriginal people of Australia as a sacred site.

The Children will also look at British geography, focusing on East Anglia, Yorkshire and the Midlands.




As artists and designers, we will:

In the Spring Term, Year 5 will follow the PKC Art scheme, developing their skills in **drawing, painting, and sculpture** while exploring key artistic techniques and concepts. They will study **perspective and proportion**, learning how to create depth and realism in their work. Pupils will also experiment with **colour theory**, mixing and blending colours to achieve desired effects. Inspired by a range of artists, they will create artwork that reflects different styles and movements.

Throughout the term, children will develop their creativity, fine motor skills, and ability to evaluate and refine their work, building confidence in artistic expression.



In computing we will:

- **Selection in Physical Computing:** Year 5 will design, code, and test programs using microcontrollers, learning how to use selection to control physical outputs like lights or motors. They will develop debugging and problem-solving skills through hands-on projects. 
- **Flat-File Databases:** Children will explore how to use databases effectively, learning to create, edit, and search data. They will develop skills in organizing information and understanding how databases are used in real-life contexts.

In Spanish we will:

To describe what rooms there are and are not in your home in Spanish

- Say where we live and what rooms we do or do not have in our homes

To be able to describe an Olympian by their sporting title and say what particular sport they play using the verb 'practicar'


- Learn some different sports in the Olympics

In RE we will:



- Explore key teachings/stories from Sikhism, Christianity and Hinduism.
- Are Sikh stories important? How do Sikhs show their commitment to God?
- **How significant is it for Christians to believe God intended Jesus to die?**
- **How can Brahman be everywhere and in everything?**

In PSHE we will:

- **Dreams and goals:** Year 5 will focus on setting personal goals, understanding the value of perseverance, and recognizing the importance of resilience in overcoming challenges. They explore strategies for achieving their aspirations and learn to appreciate the role of teamwork and collaboration in reaching shared objectives. Additionally, students are encouraged to reflect on their own strengths and how these can be utilized to accomplish their dreams. 


As musicians we will:

Young Voices: Children will learn and perform a number of songs in preparation for the Young Voices concert.



Glockenspiels: Pupils will continue to learn how to play the glockenspiel with our music teacher Mrs. Wilson.

In PE we will:

Dodgeball: Year 5 will develop their teamwork, tactical awareness, and ball-handling skills through dodgeball. They will focus on passing, dodging, defending, and working collaboratively to create successful attacking and defensive strategies. 

Invasion Games —: Pupils will enhance their tactical awareness and improve their team work participating in a number of invasion games. They will practice spatial awareness, decision-making, and teamwork to improve their performance.
